





ERASMUS MUNDUS DESIGN MEASURES

Erasmus Mundus Design Measures are projects which support the design of high-level study programmes at master level, jointly delivered by an international consortium of HEIs from different countries worldwide and, where relevant, other educational and/or non-educational partners with specific expertise and interest in the concerned study areas/professional domains.

EU Member States + Third countries associated to the Programme: Norway, Iceland, Lichtenstein, Republic of North Macedonia, Republic of Serbia, Republic of Turkey

Thid countries not associated to the Programme: All other countries throughout the world



EMJD IN A NUTSHELL...

A jointly designed fully integrated curriculum and common implementation procedures based on the Standards for Quality Assurance of Joint Programmesin the EHEA (e.g. joint selection, promotion, common services, joint administrative and financial management, etc.)

It must be delivered by a consortium of at least three HEIs from three different countries of which at least two must be EU Member States and third countries associated to the Programme

International outreach to attract and enrol excellent students worldwide (part of which may benefit from an EMJM scholarship)

WHAT IT COVERS

- Fixed Grant Agreement of 74 months independently from the length of the master
- Commitment to enrol a certain number of students per project
 - At least 4 master editions lasting 1 to 2 academic years (60, 90 or 120 ECTS)
- Start of the 1st edition no later than the academic year following the year of project selection
- At least 2 study periods in 2 countries (of which at least one in an EU Member State or a third country associated to the Programmeand both different from the country of residence of students)
- Geographical balance of students: no more than 10% of total scholarships per project awarded to students of the same nationality (does not apply to additional scholarships for targeted regions)



TAKING PART AS A STUDENT

Open to students worldwide

Applicants:

- **must hold a first higher education degreeor equivalent**
- **must not have benefited previously from an EMJM scholarship**
- The best ones can benefit from a scholarship depending on the number of scholarships available



With a budget of more than EUR 95 billion for Horizon Europe, it is the world's largest funding program for research and innovation.



NEW ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR FUNDING



 \bigstar

Horizon Europe is open to legal entities from across the world, allowing participation from non-EU and nonassociated countries.

 \bigstar

Automatic Funding Eligibility: Participants from specific low and middle-income countries listed in the Horizon Europe guide are automatically eligible for funding. This list includes countries from regions across Africa, Asia, and Latin America.



Co-Funding Mechanisms: Certain countries have set up co-funding mechanisms to support their participants in Horizon Europe projects. This arrangement can facilitate smoother participation for entities from non-EU countries that are not automatically eligible for funding

Associated Countries

Third Countries: Developing economies (BRIC, Mexico, Chile...) and industrialised countires

Funding only in exceptional cases

INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION

- **★ Focus Area:** Horizon Europe identifies priority areas where international collaboration is crucial, including climate change, health, and digital transformation. Participants can leverage these focus areas to align their projects with global challenges, increasing the relevance of their proposal
- **★ Strategic Use of Expertise:** Non-EU entities can join projects where their specific expertise, access to unique environments, or data sets are critical to the success of the research, thus increasing their chances of being part of a funded project even if not directly eligible for EU funding
- **Cross-border Collaboration**: Horizon Europe encourages projects that require or benefit from international cooperation. For participants from non-EU countries, this offers an opportunity to collaborate with European institutions, share expertise, and access cutting-edge research
- **★ Access to Research and Innovation Networks:** Engaging in Horizon Europe projects provides international participants with valuable access to European research networks, promoting knowledge exchange and capacity building



EU Missions are a novelty of Horizon Europe

EU Missions are a coordinated effort by the Commission to pool the necessary resources in terms of funding programmes, policies and regulations, as well as other activities. They also aim to mobilise and activate public and private actors, such as EU Member States, regional and local authorities, research institutes, farmers and land managers, entrepreneurs and investors to create real and lasting impact. Missions will engage with citizens to boost societal uptake of new solutions and approaches






THE HORIZON EUROPE STRATEGIC PLAN FOR 2025-2027 INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION

In combination with relevant EU policies, R&I cooperation actions with priority countries and regions will continue to help deliver the EU's external policy objectives.

These actions will include current Horizon Europe initiatives such as:

- the Africa Initiative (based on the African Union-European Union Innovation Agenda);
- ★ the Mediterranean Initiative;
- 🛨 a new EU-Latin American and Caribbean Initiative;
- the Partnership for Research and Innovation in the Mediterranean Area (PRIMA);
- ★ activities to support the Ukrainian R&I ecosystem in line with evolving needs
- joint research activities to support the implementation of the EU-India Trade and Technology Council.

Topics contributing to these initiatives will encourage the participation of entities from the regions identified.



AFRICA INITIATIVE



finding locally adapted solutions to challenges that are global in nature, but which often hit Africa hardest.

The Horizon Europe Work Programme 2021-2022 included around 40 topics with a budget of approximately €350 million under calls for proposals that were particularly relevant for cooperation with Africa.

Building on this, the Horizon Europe Work Programme 2023-2024 includes also a similar Africa Initiative II, with almost 30 topics and a total budget of approximately €300 million.

Participants can find relevant calls and funding opportunities on the EU Funding & Tenders Portal, which fostering collaboration

- provides filters to easily locate projects focusing on Africa or specific sectors. The EU-AU (African Union) Research & Innovation Partnership also plays a significant role in aligning the strategic priorities and

THE MEDITERRANEAN INITIATIVE

The EU and the Southern Mediterranean countries seek to enhance their partnership based on co-creation, coownership and shared benefits. The cooperation in the region underlines the importance of common solutions to address major challenges, such as skills mismatch, youth unemployment and brain drain. Accordingly, the Horizon Europe work programme 2023-2024 includes a Mediterranean Initiative with around 37 topics with a budget of around €320 million under Calls for Proposals that are particularly relevant for cooperation with the Mediterranean region.

The calls for proposals, open in different Work Programme parts, encourage the participation of Mediterranean entities. Topics range from:

- + developing innovative and integrated renewable energies technologies;
- **minimizing climate impact on activities like fisheries and aquaculture;**
- \star improving the reliability of alternative water resources supply;
- **±** acting to reduce plastic packaging pollution from the food system, among many others



STAFF EXCHANGE SCHEME

Collaborative R & I project implemented through secondments

- A secondment must last between 1-12 Months \bigstar
- Counted from the day of departure to the day of return \star
- At least one month must be completed, after which funding is pro-rata \bigstar
- A secondment may be split into several stays with one or several beneficiaries or \star associated partners
- Staff must work full time on secondment, even if normally they work part time. \star
- An in-built return mechanism must be foreseen \star
- Can be in different reporting periods (but only claim in one) \star





STAFF EXCHANGE SCHEME

★ 3 different legal entitles established in 3 different countries ★ 2 of which must be based in different EU member states or associated countries **t** If the organisations are from the same sector, at least 1 must be from a **Third Country**

Academic sector • Public or private higher education establishments awarding academic degrees, public or private non-profit research organisations and International European **Research Organisations (IERO)**

POST DOCTORAL FELLOWSHIPS



Enhance the creative and innovative potential of postdoctoral researchers

Funds all research areas for postdoctorate students with a MAXIMUM of 8 years' experience



Fellowships last between 12–36 months depending on the type of fellowship

All fellowships can include short stays, research trips, field work, secondments and placements in the nonacademic sector - all are optional



Fellows can be recruited to either the academic or non-academic sector






